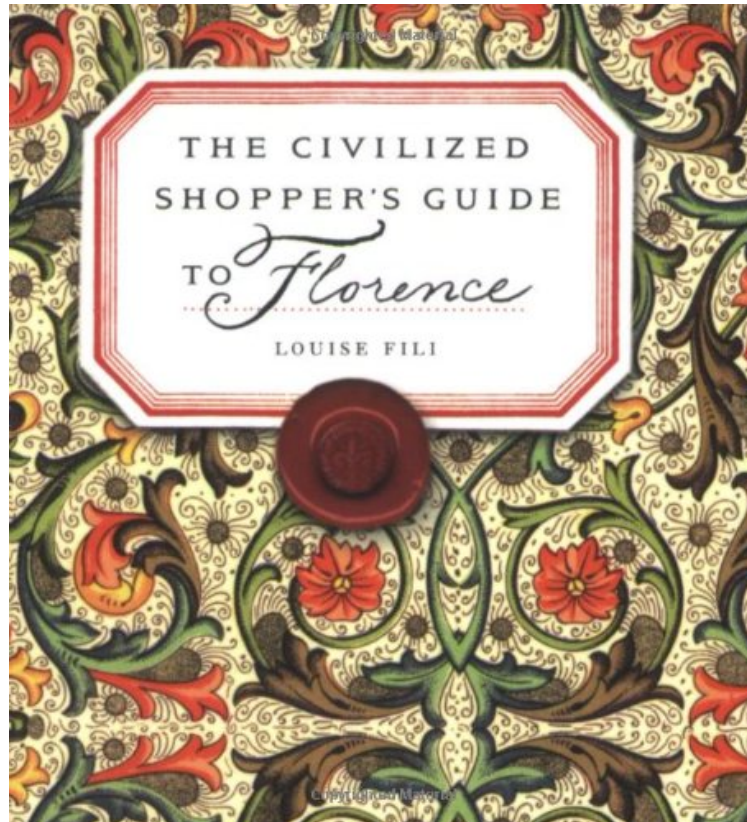

I have spent a week or more each trip, so try to do at least 2 walks each visit. 2) Each walk offers readers a chance to experience shops, many of which are still run by decendants of the original owners hundreds of years before. You can see first hand how a craftsman works on making a leather box from the beginning using just a plain piece of leather. He will show you the tools, many of which were used by great, grandfather. Each walk offers suggestions for a stop to rest at a cafe and food shops, lovely bakeries, etc. 3) Other offerings are delightful children's shops, where you can still find beautiful hand made booties, christening gowns, and other baby items. 4) i would have missed amazing antique shops, charming jewelry shops, which are quite small and another favorite....a small corner shop that just sells minatures made of pewter. 5) In the summer months i run a small Inn and found a sign maker and engraver not far from the Doumo. He did not speak English, and my Italian is only fair....but I got my lovely brass plate nicely engraved for 1/3 the price as it would have been in Canada, less then a

month later, including shipping...it was a delightful experience, and look forward to many more discoveries as found in this guide. This is how to explore the city and meet the people.
