I saw all of the open churches in the book over a month's time.Now for some helpful additions for the traveler: 1) This is a HEAVY book. That's nice for the illustrations and the armchair traveler and for later reference. But, if you are actually lugging it around Rome or in already loaded suitcases elsewhere on your journeys, this will be a major consideration. 2) This is an encyclopedic work, and you should plan on using it as such. Almost every painting, sculpture, tomb, etc. is identified. That is nice at first, but your eyes will soon glaze over the text just as it would if you tried to read a reference book straight through. 3) The authors are rarely judgmental and comparatively spend little text on the real gems in most of the churches. They really can't and still annotate everything else. You will need to carry around a second source which will be a little more finicky. 4) The authors don't and couldn't include all of Rome's churches. So, you will need to do some research to see if they missed some of the

churches that hit your own interests. In my case, it was Sant' Ivo alla Sapienza, which I can't imagine visiting Rome and not seeing. 4) This book contains no information about the opening times of the churches. You will need to factor in how you will determine those ahead of time, probably on the internet. These times seem to change wildly, and no book could keep up with them. Only one of the listed churches was completely closed for renovation. 5) This book describes architecture but really does not help you understand it. I found a wonderful companion to this book to be George Sullivan's *Not Built in a Day: Exploring the Architecture of Rome*. (It's lightweight to boot!) It isn't solely about churches but will teach you to see the beauty in the baroque. He's also much more judgmental than *The Pilgrim's Guide*. I want to stress that I did enjoy using *The Pilgrim's Guide* and would heartily recommend it. 10 of 10 people found the following review helpful. Don't leave without it.
