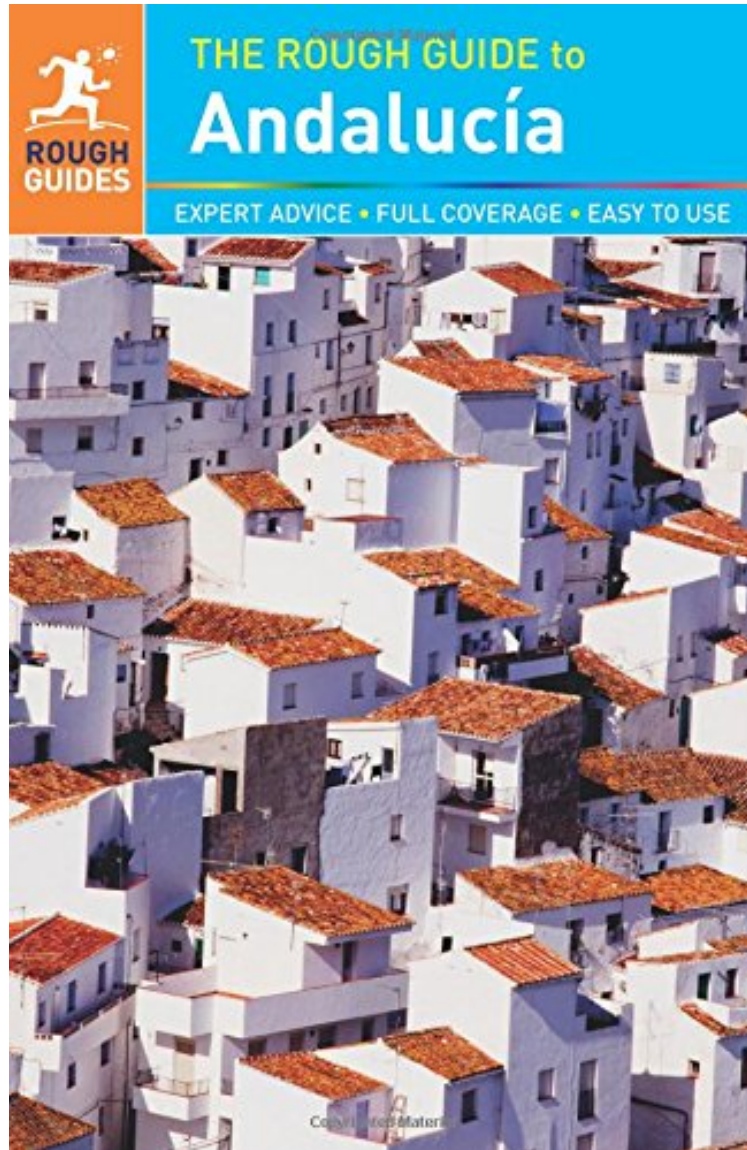

(We also bought the DK Seville Southern Spain and the Michelin Must-Sees Andalusia.) We primarily used the sections on Seville, Granada, Cordoba, and the Costa del Sol. In each city, we found Rough Guide's coverage to be thorough, educational, and interesting. Maps are

well detailed and easy to follow, too (though for Seville, I would recommend also buying a bigger foldout city map). We had mixed experiences with restaurants recommended in the guide - I'd advise cross-checking with trip advisor online. The only downside of this book is that it's big and heavy. I carried it every day and was definitely tired of it by the end.
