Old travel writingBy Benjamin TrovatoThe basic idea of these things is that a writer or journalist goes to some place unusual and describes its history, geography, politics, his personal experiences, the people he meets and anything else that might be interesting. There are hundreds of these things and they usually become obsolete in 10 or 20 years. In the winter of 1908 Bates took the Trans-Siberian Railway to east of Lake Baikal, south by sledge to the Mongolian border and south by tarantass to Urga (Ulan Bator). His view of the Russians is like most contemporary accounts was probably borrowed. He seems to have used French and some Russian in Siberia and had a translator in Mongolia. He found the Mongols simple and friendly and the Chinese aloof and inscrutable. Some parts appear to be fictionalized and the prose is a bit purple. Underlying the whole book is the idea that the Russians would probably move south into Mongolia and build a railroad southeast to the coast. It is interesting to see what the world looked like a hundred years ago. At ten bucks it is worth the money if you like this sort of thing.
